Thank you Lindsey. // Good morning.

I'm here today to talk about George Bush, the first President to govern in the spirit of the New Paradigm, a concept I'll return to in a moment. But before I talk about the New Paradigm, we need to dispose of the superficial Beltway theories about the Bush Presidency. Some say that the President's success comes from atmosphericics, such as his personality, or Mrs. Bush, or the puppies. I say that's wrong. The voters may be charmed, but they look to the bottom line: peace and prosperity; what works for them. President Bush is popular because his policies are working. And the reason things are going well for the Administration and the country is that George Bush is truly in tune with the global

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
